The ACP Program Committee invites workshop proposals for the 2019 or 2020 Annual Meeting.

The theme for the conferences has not yet been determined, so at this point we welcome all proposals that demonstrate an in-depth, engaged analytic process. Proposals should be at least three to five double-spaced pages and include one or two detailed examples of the analytic process and a brief dynamic case formulation.

The review by the Committee is a blind, i.e., anonymous, process. For this reason, please be sure that your proposal does not include any information that would identify you, including your city or state. Please attach a signed cover letter that lets us know whether or not the paper has been or will be presented in any other venues, i.e., presentations or publications, and specifies those venues. In addition, please indicate whether you would be willing to present this paper at the 2019 conference May 3-5 in Miami, Florida, or the 2020 conference, to be decided, or at either conference. Candidate Event Presentation – Presenter: Thomas Barrett, PhD

Brief presentation of case examples including work with both a young child and with an adolescent will provide impetus for discussion and candidates are encouraged to bring clinical examples, experiences, ideas and questions to contribute.
